

The fourth and final rule is: Remember Your Objective





WESTERN GAY GOES TO THE MOVIES

TAXI ZUM KLO

The landmark German gay film TAXI ZUM KLO is to be screened for a 2-week season at the F.T.I. cinema (formerly P.I.F.T.) starting Monday, June 6, and screening nightly Monday to Saturday, 6pm and 8pm.

TAXI ZUM KLO opened in Germany in 1980 and won the Max Ophuls prize in 1981. The film was also a hit at the New York Film Festival in 1981, and opened its Australian run in Sydney and Melbourne in October, 1982.

Australia is the only country to have banned the film, until 2 minutes of explicit sex was cut. The film runs for 90 minutes, is rated R, and is subtitled.

The Story:

Frank is a teacher by day and an adventurer by night, who meets Bernd at a movie and they begin an affair. But, while Bernd dreams of happiness and security in the country, Frank needs the excitement of men, leather and sex.

The humour of the situation is revealed in lines such as "...so when we're an old gay couple living in the country with our lesbian cook, we'll adopt a mongoloid child and write on the door, beware of the dog."

The Director:

Frank Ripplloh was born in 1949 and worked as a teacher between 1972 and 1980, when disciplinary proceedings began against him due to his open admission of his homosexuality. With money gained from the settlement of the trial, he financed this autobiographical film about himself and his boyfriend playing themselves in the lead roles.

To quote Herr Ripplloh "...to label the film a "homosexual" film is an injustice. I consider it to be a sad film

which gives expression to both the longing for a relationship and its impossibility ... despite all the humour. The film is a film about the possibility of love. It just happens to be situated within the homosexual milieu ... " and "After all, I don't want to show only the sugar and spice side of homosexuality, the sunny side of life. My film not only has wit but sadness as well, just like myself. Otherwise, it wouldn't be honest. We've surely seen enough cheap emotional or didactic homosexual and non-homosexual films!"

The Critics:



NEWSWEEK, David Ansen, 10/81 — "You can't help but like the guy, and to like him is to like his movie. They share the same energy, the same bouncing rhythm. It's Ripplloh's sunny un-self pitying disposition that keeps TAXI from being merely sordid. It's as explicit as any porn movie, but in this context, the sex is a form of honest reportage. It's given the emphasis it has in his life, sometimes funny, sometimes hot, sometimes gross. This may be the first post gay liberation movie: there's no didacticism, no special pleading, no 'problem'. Ripplloh isn't trying to show that homosexuals are just average 'Joes' any more than he's saying this is the truth of homosexual life. It's his truth, no more, no less, and the audience is free to flee from his vision in horror or take him on his own funky, droll, horny terms. One thing is sure — the man's a film-maker."

NEW YORK, 19/81 — "In TAXI ZUM KLO, which was one of the more enjoyable movies at the New York Film Festival, cruising is neither sordid and brutal (as in CRUISING) nor tedious and anguished (as in NIGHTHAWKS); it's essentially comic."

THE BULLETIN, Sandra Hall, 11/82 — "Frank Ripplloh's lustily explicit celebration of his own promiscuity is still the most remarkable film about homosexuality ever seen here; its release made all the more interesting by the fact it coincides with Hollywood's latest word on the subject — the rapid and cloying PARTNERS ..."






Hep B — What's the fuss?

Hep B is a sinister, insidious disease. Consider the following facts:—


- U.S. figures indicate that between 55% and 80% of gay men contact Hep B.
- Between 50% and 60% of infections are sub-clinical, ie. show no symptoms.
- There is no cure (at this time) for Hepatitis B.
- About 10% of infected persons become chronic carriers, spreading the virus forever and possibly not being aware of having it themselves.
- Chronic carriers have a 273 times greater relative risk of liver cancer.
- Cirrhosis of the liver is often associated with Hep B.
- Hep B is sexually transmitted (via semen, saliva, urine or tears).
- The Hep B virus has an incubation period of 2-6 months.

A severe Hepatitis B infection may require hospitalisation and more than six months of convalescence. Between 1% and 5% of cases are fatal.

Symptoms of Hep B include fever, fatigue, jaundice and nausea.

In Summary

The above suggests gay men have about a 50:50 chance of getting Hep B. They may not know they've got it. One in ten will infect others for the rest of his life. Hep B can be devastating, even lethal, or it can be mild but very adverse in the long run. There is no cure. Hep B can be prevented with the vaccine or you can take your chances. Good luck!



H.B. VAX

The long-awaited vaccine to prevent Hepatitis B is now available in Perth. If you don't know about the dangers of Hep B, then read the accompanying article.

The vaccine is being distributed by Commonwealth Serum Laboratories and is only available on prescription through a pharmacist or direct from your doctor.

The vaccination regimen consists of a series of three injections, the first two a month apart and the third, six months after the first.

As the vaccine can only prevent the disease and is not effective as a treatment, it is essential to have blood tests prior to deciding on a vaccination program.

The Homosexual Counselling & Information Service can provide details of doctors who can assist you if you do not feel comfortable with or do not have a regular general practitioner. Ring the HCIS on 328 9044 (8-11pm any night). Persons taking the AIDS screening tests at Royal Perth will be advised as to whether a Hep B vaccination program is desirable or useful.

The cost of the vaccine for each injection will be around \$50.00 if you purchase directly from your doctor or from Dallimore's Pharmacy in Newcastle St.

CAMP-W.A. has made representation to the Federal Health Minister and Dr. Ric Charlesworth (Federal M.P. for Perth) to have the H.B. Vax put on the National Health Scheme List. Given the cost and the current state of the government's budget, CAMP is not overly hopeful.

The H.B. Vax has been extensively tested in the U.S.A. and since being officially approved by U.S. authorities, it has been administered to over 200,000 persons. The vaccine is effective in over 95% of individuals after the three doses.

The vaccine has proved remarkably free of adverse consequences. Less than a quarter of people vaccinated report any

reaction at all and in the majority of cases this is only soreness at the vaccination site. Only occasionally a mild fever, fatigue and headache will result and rarely a high fever occurs. In only 6 cases out of 200,000 has a serious illness resulted from vaccination.

Some concern has been raised about the possibility of the vaccine being contaminated by the agent which causes AIDS as the vaccine is a blood product manufactured in the U.S.A. This view is not supported by currently available evidence. A joint review of the production process for the vaccine and of empirical data has been conducted in the U.S.A. by the Centres for Disease Control (CDC), the National Institutes for Health (NIH) and the Food & Drug Administration. They concluded that the purification and inactivation process in manufacture is known to inactivate representatives of all known groups of animal viruses. They noted that each batch is safely tested in primates and that no known occurrence of AIDS has been associated with the vaccine.


The Commonwealth Serum Laboratories concludes: "Thus, both current microbiologic and empirical data provide no support for the suggestion that HBV vaccine might carry an etiologic risk for AIDS."


It is not possible at this stage to be certain, but it is worthwhile to remember that Hep V can kill you too if rather more slowly than AIDS. Also, one report has indicated that 95% of AIDS victims have had Hepatitis B. And the risk of catching Hep B appears at this stage very much higher than the risk of catching AIDS.

LESBIAN COUPLES; SPECIAL ISSUES

Lesbian couples: who are we? Descriptions range from the traditional view that sees us only in terms of our sexual activities, to the liberal heterosexual view that we are "just like any other couple" (and therefore no special effort is required to get to know us or to recognise and correct the injustices we deal with every day), to one version of the radical feminist lesbian perspective which states that our relationships don't or shouldn't have anything in common with heterosexual relationships. In fact, I find that many of our daily experiences as couples, many of our joys and difficulties, are similar to those of heterosexuals. However, we also have unique experiences, both as Gay people and as lesbians, and must cope with the unique issues in our relationships.

THE LESBIAN COUPLE IN THE HETEROSEXUAL WORLD: THE COMING OUT DILEMMA

Perhaps one of the most difficult decisions we lesbians face is to determine in which areas of our lives we can be ourselves, and in which areas we must wear a mask. If we stay in the closet, we risk never being known as we truly are, never having intimacy with family and friends, and losing self-respect and any sense of power and control of our lives. On the other hand, if we come out, we risk losing the love and support of our family and friends, forfeiting our jobs or curtailing our promotions, feeling the isolation of stigma, and in some places even getting arrested. Nevertheless, the advantages of coming out are great: a wonderful feeling of freedom, an increase in self-respect and integrity, the knowledge that we are doing something that may improve the lot of lesbians and male homosexuals everywhere, and the opportunity to create friendships in which we are truly accepted as ourselves.

The stress on the individual who must make these decisions is obvious: what is not so obvious is the stress these decisions place on the couple. Not only do the individual pressures on the individual bring more anxiety, confusion, fear and anger into the relationship, but the decision that each woman makes for herself will directly affect the relationship.

Couples run into the most conflict when the two women are at two different stages in the 'coming-out' process. Thus, a lesbian who has come out with her family, who perhaps is beginning to feel more comfortable about her lesbianism and to whom openness and honesty are very important, will have great difficulty pretending to be the 'roommate' when her partner's parents come for dinner. For many lesbians, home is a sanctuary in an unsafe world, and even those who resent the invasion of their home by people who are ignorant or disrespectful of their love relationship.

What is the impact of such situations on the couple? As in a juggling act, things have a tendency to fall and get broken. What may suffer here is the trust that each woman feels for the other as well as herself. A few years ago, a friend with an important professional job threw a party at her house for some of her co-workers. Very few people knew she was a lesbian, so her lover's clothes closet was carefully shut, books hidden behind other books, a few pictures put away in drawers and precautions to make sure nobody knew the household was lesbian. In addition, her lover, who works in the same profession, was invited to the party but had to pretend she didn't live in the same house.

This is a particularly dramatic example of how fears can negate each other and invalidate our relationship. This happens all the time, usually in more subtle ways than we know. Chipping away at the

trust, loyalty and respect we feel for each other, these 'little' betrayals can undermine the very foundations of our love relationships.

Problems with families, especially around holiday time, when each member of the couple, seen as a single person, is expected to go home to her own family — do not automatically disappear when we 'come out' to our relatives. Most family members react between two extremes of humour and approval and the lover usually is not treated as one of the family, at least not initially.

The couple may take out on each other the frustration and anger they feel in response to what they feel of their families' treatment of them. "Why did you let her get away with that?" "Why didn't you confront her on the shit she was saying?" "Why didn't you?" "Well, she's YOUR mother!" Many such fights revolve around disagreements on how to handle family. Each woman may feel torn between loyalty to the lover and fear of confronting parents and other relatives. Usually the partner who is more open with her family cannot understand why her partner is 'cowardly'. The two lovers can become pitted against each other, making it more difficult for them to fight the real enemy, the homophobia in the world and in themselves.

Additional stresses in the relationship can arise from differences between the lover's attitudes of being seen together publicly — as a function of different vulnerabilities in their work situation or different degrees of self-acceptance. These stress range from inconvenience (can we go to the movies together on only a Friday and Saturday night or during the week?) to various differences between the social and political activities each partner wants to engage in. Does one lover want to go to the bars, while the other is afraid to be seen there? Does one lover want to become involved in Gay/lesbian organisations, and is it a threat to the other lover? Again, these issues are a problem mostly for lovers who differ considerably in their attitudes and interests. However, even for a couple who share similar interests and values in such interests as coming out, political activity and visibility in public, many conflicts can arise from smaller differences and from the difficulty of coping with such emotion-laden issues. How can we deal with these conflicts? The lover who has come to put demands and pressures on the more fearful partner, yet at the same time encouraging her to take risks. Try to recognise that you and your partner are different individuals with different capacities, needs and circumstances.

The lover who is further in the closet must try not to feel threatened by her partners' decisions and not to invalidate or belittle what is important to the

partner. try to keep some separation between your identity and your lover's identity, and try not to sabotage your lover's growth because of your own fears. If you are frightened that your lover's political activities will give her less time for you, that the two of you may eventually find your differences irreconcilable and have to separate, or that your lesbianism will be exposed as a result of your lover's activities, then express your fears to your lover, rather than attacking her with statements like "Gay liberation is stupid!" or "NOW meetings are a waste of time."

In situations where it seems impossible to come out, each lover can still show basic respect for the other and for the relationship. This means for instance, not telling your mother about the fantastic (and invented) date you had last weekend when your lover is sitting with you at Christmas dinner; it means making sure that people know your lover is important to you (even if you don't want them to know she is your lover) and that they treat her with respect and courtesy; it means avoiding situations where people who don't know about your relationship come to your house.

Our love relationship can be a tremendous support in dividing paranoia from reality. By discussing the pros and cons of coming out in each situation, by role-playing (one lover plays the parents, boss, friends, etc. in a dialogue intended to test the possible consequences of coming out) and by brainstorming for new ideas and strategies, the two lovers can be of great help to each other in making 'coming out' decisions. At best, each lover can give the other some of the courage that 'coming out' requires and some of the support that dealing with the outside world necessitates. If desired, both lovers can be present in a potentially difficult 'coming out' situation, so that the one who is under fire will have support. In addition, each lover can help the other put things in perspective when something goes wrong, for example in a family situation. We tend to be so vulnerable with our families that we have trouble sorting out craziness from reality, and our lovers can provide a voice of sanity and reason.

WHAT IS AIDS?

Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome is the name given to a breakdown of the body's own system of fighting disease which is not related to genetic factors or a known specific disease of the immune system.

The initial symptoms are similar to those of many other diseases and include: persistent fatigue, fever, diarrhea, night sweats, swollen lymph glands. It is often accompanied by repeated virus infections such as colds, flu, cold sores (herpes simplex). These infections recur as the body's immune system steadily breaks down.

It can be clinically diagnosed by blood tests. These tests examine a particular class of white blood cells (T-cells). A person with AIDS has too few T-cells and many of the T-cells may be abnormal. T-cells can be further analysed into two sub-groups: one sub-group activates the immune system against infections; the other sub-group stops the first sub-group from over-reacting. AIDS sufferers have an imbalance in these sub-groups with the result that the immune system is not activated.

AIDS itself does not kill. It does however, allow many otherwise minor or rare infections to get out of hand. The major killers have been a particular pneumonia (PCP) and a cancer (Kaposi's Sarcoma). Others include a form of herpes which attacks the central nervous system and a parasitic infection of the brain.


The cause of AIDS is unknown and the subject of some speculation. Current theories include: a new virus; a mutated known virus; an existing virus which is activated in the presence of another substance(s); a complex group of factors which are individually not very significant but when combined are explosive. A genetic susceptibility is suggested as one factor in determining how severely an individual will be affected.

Whatever the specific cause, it would appear that AIDS is in some way trans-

missible through sexual encounters. However, sexual contact with an AIDS victim may only lead to AIDS in a very small proportion of cases, if at all. By extensive case tracing, AIDS victims have been linked to other AIDS victims in a significant number of cases. But is this why they got AIDS or is it coincidence? At this stage, there is no definite answer. If it is transmissible, it would appear to take between 3 months and 2 years to develop. If it is contagious during this period, we are facing a monumental horror story.

No cure for AIDS is apparent. Interferon and a wide range of drugs have been tried. Some of these have effectively overcome particular infections generally or only in some cases. In no case has AIDS itself been reversed.




